

LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

WHAT IS A LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT?

A Land Acknowledgement is a formal statement that recognizes and respects Indigenous Peoples as traditional stewards of this land and the enduring relationship that exists between Indigenous Peoples and their traditional territories.

WHY DO WE RECOGNIZE THE LAND?

To recognize the land is an expression of gratitude and appreciation to those whose territory you reside on and a way of honoring the Indigenous People who have been living and working on the land from time immemorial. It is important to understand the long-standing history that has brought you to reside on the land, and to seek to understand your place within that history.

Land acknowledgements do not exist in a past tense, or historical context: colonialism is a current ongoing process, and we need to build our mindfulness of our present participation. It is also worth noting that acknowledging the land is Indigenous protocol.



ACPA24 ELDER-IN-RESIDENCE

Mr. George Strack is a citizen of the Miami Tribe of Oklahoma and has worked in cultural revitalization and Native American

youth education for the last thirty years. George is a Vietnam veteran who served in the United States Air Force from 1967 to 1971. George graduated from the Native American Education Services College with a degree in Public Policy in 2003, with continuing graduate studies at Northeastern Illinois University and Northwestern University.

George served as the Tribal Historic Preservation Officer for the Miami Tribe from 2009 to 2015, nominating several sites to both the National Register of Historic Places and the Tribal Register of Historic Places. He was also a Research Designer/Instructor for the Urban Explorer Summer Youth Education Program at the Chicago American Indian Center from 2003 to 2010. Since 2020, George has worked as a Research Designer/Instructor for the Chicago Urban ISTEAM Summer Youth Education program at the Northwestern Center for Native American and Indigenous Studies.

ACPA24 LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT

ACPA acknowledges that our ACPA24 Convention is taking place on the traditional unceded homelands of the Council of the Three Fires: the Ojibwe, Odawa, and Potawatomi Nations and the Illinois Confederacy: The Peoria and Kaskaskia Nations. Many other tribes, such as the Myaamia, Ho-Chunk, Menominee, and Sac and Fox, also called this area home. The region has long been a center for Indigenous people to gather, trade, and maintain kinship ties. Today, one of the largest urban American Indian communities in the United States resides in Chicago. Members of this community continue to contribute to the life of this city and to celebrate their heritage, practice traditions, and care for the land and waterways. We acknowledge that we are on occupied land that was forcibly taken, and we affirm that while we cannot change history, we can work for justice.

Beyond acknowledging the land and in recognition of modern and historical settler colonialism, including that perpetuated by North American institutions of higher education, ACPA actively commits to supporting Higher Education in decolonizing their practice and scholarship through our mission, values, and the Strategic Imperative for Racial Justice and Decolonization.

STRATEGIC IMPERATIVE FOR RACIAL JUSTICE & DECOLONIZATION

In 2016, ACPA-College Educators International embarked on an exciting journey to address systemic racism and historical and contemporary colonization apparent within higher education institutions and student affairs as a field. As such, the organization, moves forward in its work to support faculty, administrators, and students to reflect upon their investments in oppressive systems of domination and to act to rebuild equitable places where all people can thrive and live out their full potentials. With that in mind, the Association works toward these goals with recognition of the following guiding words.

ACPA will direct resources, energy, and time toward addressing racial justice in student affairs and higher education around the world. Our lens is intersectional, intentional, and directed. The focus is on reducing the oppression of communities of color at the intersections of their identities, knowing that all oppressions are linked and that the work is ongoing. Our goal is to provide leading research and scholarship; tools for personal, professional, and career development; and innovative praxis opportunities for members that will actively inform and reshape higher education. We move toward this goal knowing that the roles and daily tasks of our jobs are important to the functioning of colleges and universities. We also know that racial justice and decolonization and the tasks of our jobs do not sit as dichotomous poles. Racial justice and decolonization is at our core; it underlies the work we each must do every day, in every way we can.

To summarize these operational truths, as an Association, ACPA believes:

- All forms of oppression are linked.
- Racism and colonization are real, present, enduring, intersectional, and systemic forms of oppression.
- Racism and colonization have informed the experience of all of us in higher education.
- Advocacy and social change require us to work to dismantle racism and colonization.
- Our collective education, research and scholarship, advocacy, and capacity will create positive change in higher education.
- We believe in and have hope for our individual capacity, desire, and drive to grow, learn, and change.

As a Convention steering team, we welcome you to take a chance and engage in a curricular offering that may seem divergent from the types of learning and development opportunities with which you regularly engage. We as a program team, and an Association, are here to support you in the ways we can, and we hope you will join us in rethinking and reshaping the future of higher education and student affairs.

ACPA/NASPA PROFESSIONAL COMPETENCIES

ADVISING AND SUPPORTING (A/S)

Addresses the knowledge, skills, and dispositions related to providing advising and support to individuals and groups through direction, feedback, critique, referral, and guidance. Through developing advising and supporting strategies that take into account self-knowledge and the needs of others, we play critical roles in advancing the holistic wellness of ourselves, our students, and our colleagues.



ASSESSMENT, EVALUATION, AND RESEARCH (AER)

Focuses on the ability to design, conduct, critique, and use various AER methodologies and the results obtained from them, to utilize AER processes and their results to inform practice, and to shape the political and ethical climate surrounding AER processes and uses in higher education.

LAW, POLICY, AND GOVERNANCE (LPG)

Includes the knowledge, skills, and dispositions relating to policy development processes used in various contexts, the application of legal constructs, compliance/policy issues, and the understanding of governance structures and their impact on one's practice.

LEADERSHIP (LEAD)

Addresses the knowledge, skills, and dispositions required of a leader, with or without positional authority. Leadership involves both the individual role of a leader and the leadership process of individuals working together to envision, plan, and affect change in organizations and respond to broad-based constituencies and issues. This can include working with students, student affairs colleagues, faculty, and community members.

ORGANIZATIONAL AND HUMAN RESOURCES (OHR)

Includes knowledge, skills, and dispositions used in the management of institutional human capital, financial, and physical resources. This competency area recognizes that student affairs professionals bring personal strengths and grow as managers through challenging themselves to build new skills in the selection, supervision, motivation, and evaluation of staff; resolution of conflict; management of the politics of organizational discourse; and the effective application of strategies and techniques associated with financial resources, facilities management, fundraising, technology, crisis management, risk management and sustainable resources.

PERSONAL AND ETHICAL **FOUNDATIONS (PEF)**

Involves the knowledge, skills, and dispositions to develop and maintain integrity in one's life and work; this includes thoughtful development, critique, and adherence to a holistic and comprehensive standard of ethics and commitment to one's own wellness and growth. Personal and ethical foundations are aligned because integrity has an internal locus informed by a combination of external ethical guidelines, an internal voice of care, and our own lived experiences. Our personal and ethical foundations grow through a process of curiosity, rejection, and self-authorship.





SOCIAL JUSTICE AND INCLUSION (SJI)

While there are many conceptions of social justice and inclusion in various contexts, for the purposes of this competency area, it is defined here as both a process and a goal which includes the knowledge, skills, and dispositions needed to create learning environments that foster equitable participation of all groups while seeking to address and acknowledge issues of oppression, privilege, and power. This competency involves student affairs educators who have a sense of their own agency and social responsibility that includes others, their community, and the larger global context. Student affairs educators may incorporate social justice and inclusion competencies into their practice through seeking to meet the needs of all groups, equitably distributing resources, raising social consciousness, and repairing past and current harms on campus communities.

STUDENT LEARNING AND **DEVELOPMENT (SLD)**

Addresses the concepts and principles of student development and learning theory. This includes the ability to apply theory to improve and inform student affairs practice.

TECHNOLOGY (TECH)

Focuses on the use of digital tools, resources, and technologies for the advancement of student learning, development, and success as well as the improved performance of student affairs professionals. Included within this area are knowledge, skills, and dispositions that lead to the generation of digital literacy and digital citizenship within communities of students, student affairs professionals, faculty members, and colleges and universities as a whole.

VALUES, PHILOSOPHY, AND HISTORY (VPH)

Involves knowledge, skills, and dispositions that connect the history, philosophy, and values of the student affairs profession to one's current professional practice. This competency area embodies the foundations of the profession from which current and future research, scholarship, and practice will change and grow. The commitment to demonstrating this competency area ensures that our present and future practices are informed by an understanding of the profession's history, philosophy, and values.

Professional Competencies Update

In October 2023, ACPA and NASPA shared that they are once again partnering to revise and update the ACPA/NASPA Professional Competencies for Student Affairs Educators, along with the complementary rubrics, with a planned release for the updates in Spring 2025.

Feedback was collected in early 2024 via surveys and focus groups with members of both organizations.

Additionally, ACPA24 attendees are invited to share thoughts and feedback in person on Tuesday, 19 March at 2:30pm in Regency A.

ACPA-College Student Educators International, headquartered in Washington, D.C. at the National Center for Higher Education, is a leading comprehensive student affairs association that advances student affairs and engages students for a lifetime of learning and discovery. ACPA has nearly 6,000 members representing 1,200 institutions from across the U.S. and around the world. ACPA members include graduate and undergraduate students enrolled in student affairs/higher education administration programs, faculty, and student affairs educators, from entry level to senior student affairs officers, and organizations and companies that are engaged in the campus marketplace.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF OUR **FOUNDING, 100 YEARS AGO**

Who we are today as an association has direct roots to the story of our founding. Our story began with nine women who took bold action to create space and community for themselves in an era where there was no other organization where they could connect.

The first meeting of what is known today as ACPA-College Student Educators occurred on October 21, 1924, in Chicago, Illinois, where we will once again gather in March 2024 to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Association at the ACPA24 Convention, Chicago is also where former ACPA leaders met to honor the 25th anniversary in 1949 and the 50th anniversary in 1974.

What do we know about that first meeting of our founders in 1924? That first meeting welcomed 12 individuals, 11 of which were women, who were invited as guests to the National Association of Deans of Women (NADW) conference, sponsored by the National Education Association's (DEA) Department of Superintendence. The unifying commonality among these 12 campus professionals was that they each had responsibilities for helping college students find employment following graduation. It was at this meeting in October 1924 that nine of the participants, all of whom were women, decided to organize themselves as the National Association of Appointment Secretaries (NAAS). This meeting was the start of ACPA.

Each of the nine founding members of NAAS, today known as ACPA, agreed upon an annual membership dues payment of \$2.00 and agreed to a common purpose of promoting and developing the work of "appointment offices throughout the country, emphasizing cooperation, research, and service" (Fulfilling Visions, 2011). Archival records clearly indicate that two of the nine attendees were May L. Cheney from the University of California at Berkeley and Margaret Cameron from the University of Michigan. Although it cannot be fully verified, it is likely that three additional participants in the first meeting in 1924 were Helen Wright from Smith College, R.G. Reynolds from Teacher's College - Columbia University, and Elizabeth B. Snell from Stanford University.

May Lucretia Shepard Cheney is credited as the organizer of the efforts to create NAAS as she became the first president of the organization from 1924-1925. She graduated from the

University of California Berkeley in 1883 with the Bachelor of Letters degree and is considered the first woman to begin a college appointment service in the United States.



By the second convening of NAAS in Cincinnati, Ohio in February 1925, the new organization had grown from nine to 79 members. May Cheney's presidential leadership was supported by Vice President Margaret Cameron, who went on to serve as NAAS president from 1925-1926 and was then re-elected to the role from 1926-1927. In the immediate years that followed, NAAS would continue to grow and flourish. By 1929, organizational leaders believed the NAAS naming was no longer inclusive of the diversity of member responsibilities, and the association changed its name to the National Association of Personnel and Placement Officers (NAPPO). This new name and acronym was only utilized for two years when NAPPO became the American College Personnel Association (ACPA) in 1931.

Since our founding in 1924, ACPA is a valuescentered leadership association that has always and will continue to boldly transform higher education in our next 100 years. One hundred years later after the first meeting in 1924 ACPA is nearly 6,000 members strong. Not without struggle and challenge, ACPA has always vocalized and reinforced our leadership in equity and inclusion work through bold support of students, professionals, and faculty who are systemically excluded from places, spaces, and rules built for and reinforced by majorities.

We have always allowed the future to lead us, and in turn have boldly transformed higher education, often ahead of societal and higher education industry conditions. We have critically questioned and challenged the philosophical approach to our work, our priorities, and the profession. We have re-calibrated our mission, our values, our names, our partnerships with other associations, and even our governance structures. Our advocacy work extends as deeply as our long-term investment strategy, as the Association today only invests in organizations with significant representation by women on corporate boards, a tribute to our nine founding women and our first two past presidents. It is in this spirit that ACPA's story began in 1924. It is in this same spirit that ACPA continues to

press and advocate for positive social change in the world through bold transformation in higher education. It is the same spirit that propels us into the start of our next 100 years.








